Labor Solidarity Resolution

WHEREAS, In-Home Supportive Services workers provide critical care to the well-being of thousands of people with disabilities and the elderly in our community; and

WHEREAS, by 2020, the San Mateo County senior population is projected to grow by forty percent (40%); and

WHEREAS, personal and home care aide jobs will increase by seventy-percent (70%) between 2010 and 2020 and continue as the fastest growing occupation in the U.S.; and

WHEREAS, all In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS) homecare workers in the Bay Area live on an income that is thirty-one percent (31%) below the self-sufficiency income line; and

WHEREAS, five thousand and four (5,004) San Mateo County IHSS homecare workers are sixty percent (60%) below the self-sufficiency income line; and

WHEREAS, while income inequality and access to affordable long-term care are two great challenges of our time; and

WHEREAS, the negotiators for San Mateo County have denied IHSS homecare workers a pathway to a living wage by not bargaining in a timely manner and not addressing the wage and healthcare needs that have been dormant since 2004

WHEREAS, economic recovery in San Mateo County is leaving women and minorities behind; and

WHEREAS, three in four home care workers in San Mateo County are women and one in five single moms in the county live in poverty; and

WHEREAS, the labor movement is one of the most powerful forces to reverse income inequality, uplift women, and to create quality-paying jobs for the future,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

- 1. That the San Mateo Labor Council officially supports the IHSS Homecare Worker Contract Campaign.
- 2. That the Council designates the campaign as a high priority.
- **3.** That the Council shall take action within its authority to bring its strength and resources in support of San Mateo County IHSS homecare workers.
